Legislatively Speaking

This past week, the GOP-led congress passed bipartisan legislation to protect our national security and prevent a bad deal with Iran. The bill is critical to holding Iran accountable, putting a check on President Obama and giving the American people a voice in the ongoing negotiations with Iran over its nuclear weapons capabilities. For months, President Obama has been acting unilaterally on a deal with Iran, while repeatedly missing critical deadlines, with negotiations taking a dangerous course. Iran is no friend to America, and our leaders should not be kowtowing to them on a deal that could affect our national security, safety and peace. The only way to make sure that Iran is truly held accountable is to ensure that Congress has final say on any final deal. The GOP-led congress is taking action to hold Obama accountable for his reckless foreign policy.

Senator Ted Cruz filed an amendment to the Trade Act of 2015 to lock in assurances that the legislation cannot be used to change federal immigration law. Sen. Cruz stated, "The Obama administration has repeatedly assured Members of Congress that there is nothing in the Trade Act of 2015 that would allow the President to unilaterally make changes to federal immigration laws. I agree, and we should put it in writing and make it binding law. I am a strong supporter of free trade, but I cannot support legislation that would allow the President to once again circumvent Congress to enact his own immigration laws. Since the Obama Administration has emphatically argued that TPA will not affect immigration, it should support this amendment, which makes that promise explicit."

Our Republican-led Texas Legislature made border security a top priority by passing a comprehensive, permanent solution. The new border security measures strengthen anti-human trafficking laws, fund cameras, and detection software as well as 250 new DPS troopers along our border to keep Texas families safe.

Tax relief continues to be a critical component to further strengthen the Texas economy and the Texas House and Senate Republicans are working hard to deliver the tax breaks Texans expect.

Thursday, May the 14th, was the final day for the House to hear house bills. We worked late to ensure good bills get a chance to pass. Conservatives pushed hard on the house floor to bring up several important issues; however, opposition used several legislative technicalities to block our attempts. To highlight the importance of this, even Governor Abbott came to support the chamber.

'This Administration has taken an approach of paralysis by analysis'

WASHINGTON – In remarks on the Senate floor today, U.S. Sen. John Cornyn (R-TX) responded to the fall of the Iraqi city of Ramadi by calling on the Obama Administration to provide a clear strategy to defeat ISIL.

"I'm frustrated by the President's lack of leadership and by the Obama Administration's failure to put together a strong and cohesive strategy to combat ISIL, but it's more serious than that."

"Since ISIL began taking large swaths of territory last summer, this Administration has taken an approach of paralysis by analysis. In other words, doing nothing. When they do take action, it seems ad hoc and piecemeal, and not driven by overarching objectives or any strategy that is apparent to me."

"Just a few months ago, President Obama claimed ISIL was on the defensive. Well, that's not exactly the case today, nor was it really then. And it's not exactly the picture of the kind of leadership that we need from our commander in chief. By giving our troops a difficult mission to degrade and ultimately destroy ISIL but not providing them with a strategy and the resources they need to do so, the President is essentially making them operate with one more hand tied behind their back."

"So I hope the President will reconsider after this latest dramatic setback in Ramadi. I hope President Obama will provide us with a strategy to degrade and destroy ISIL."

"I hope this is a wake-up call to the Obama Administration and that they will provide the Congress and the American people and our troops a clear path forward to defeat ISIL and to rid the world of this terror army."

Sharron had three immediate goals when she retired in 2012: Lose weight, join Bible Study Fellowship (BSF), and say "no" for six months. But once that six months was over, it didn't take long for her to jump into her self-professed hobby: Volunteering.

Sharron and Arnold got married a month after she graduated from high school, and Arnold's work took them on quite a journey during the nine years "BC", *before children*. She attended Texas Tech one year, UNT one year, LSU, and

after 4 years and 4 colleges, she graduated from Georgia State University in Atlanta, Georgia. After that, there were 18 months in Panama and 18 in Trinidad. Living in foreign countries gave them both a deeper love and appreciation for the United States. Looking for opportunities beyond and prior to teaching, Sharron sold Tupperware and real estate, and was VP at a bank. Returning to Texas in 1986, she volunteered at their children's elementary school, which grew into 8 years teaching 5th grade, 2 years at 7th grade, 4 years as Principal and director of special programs at a charter school in Irving, 10 years in administration as District Assessment Coordinator with the last 2 years as Principal of Callisburg Elementary School. Her background has been invaluable helping her work with the school board, teachers, students and parents, and juggle local needs with state and federal requirements. "Our district is agricultural, with no industry, but also encompasses Lake Kiowa," she explained. "Fifty percent of our students are considered Economically Disadvantaged and that qualifies them for free and reduced meal plans."

Experiencing the nutritional needs of her students and the value of the Back Pack Buddies program is what made Sharron say "yes" when asked to be on the board at VISTO. "Back Pack Buddies is a direct benefit to the kids. A teacher, counselor or administrator can recommend a student. The only qualification is the child must be on the free and reduced food program." The biggest surprise: She quickly discovered the VISTO board is "a working board" when each member was directed to get out and raise \$8,000 for the food bank!

Being a group leader in the interdenominational Bible Study Fellowship (BSF) has been one of the most rewarding aspects of her retirement, Sharron explained. Relishing her family, immersing herself in the Bible, and excelling at her hobby, she is constantly inspired by one of her favorite books and authors, The Power of Positive Thinking by Norman Vincent Peale.

Carolyn has come full circle, leaving Cooke County to begin her career after graduating from UNT, and returning in 2011 to be closer to family. In Dallas, she worked over 30 years for a company in the architectural graphics industry, first at the World Trade Center, then the Design District, and finally opening an office in Arlington, serving a four-state region.

Back to her original stomping grounds, she is now Marketing Coordinator for Cooke County Electric Cooperative Association, www.cceca.com. CCECA provides electric service to over 9,600 member customers in Cooke, Montague, Grayson, Wise and Denton Counties, and is part of Touchstone Energy Cooperatives, a nationwide alliance of over 740 member-owned cooperatives. In addition to her marketing duties, she plans special events and functions for the company's employees, now numbering 62. She enjoys working for a company with "Concern for Community" as one of its seven founding principles.

Carolyn takes that principle personally. Raising two daughters, she was always active in supporting them in school, sports, and extracurricular activities. Back here in Cooke County, she chaired the first two "Power of the Purse" events for United Way, was on the committee last year and is on it again this year. She has been a Gainesville Area Chamber of Commerce ambassador for two years. This June she will complete a term on the board of Soroptimist of Gainesville. And in September of last year, she joined the board of CASA, because "I believe in their mission of advocacy for abused and neglected children who have no one else to speak on their behalf." Being a board member enables her to lend her business skills to the organization when called upon.

When asked if there was a quote or author or book that inspires her, Carolyn talked about the importance of being proud of who you are, and enjoying the unique qualities of others: "Celebrate what makes you different! Be yourself and celebrate the uniqueness of others." This is something she encourages her daughters to do as well, to add richness and exuberance to their lives. As a Facebook post says, "Be yourself. Everyone else is already taken!"

Rosina's interest in building strong families may be a result of her own experiences. She is the youngest of seven children and shortly after she was born, she and the two youngest brothers were separated and placed in the foster care system. She moved from family to family until at the age of three she was permanently placed with a couple who were appointed by the court as her legal guardians. At age four, the family moved to Texas, then to Florida where she completed her elementary and middle school years. Returning to Texas, she graduated from Lewisville High School and attended UNT. Rosina, who started UNT in computer programming, loves working on computers. "It's fun to figure out how to do things, and what the problems are, and find solutions," she said.

Since 1991, she has done business administration and accounting for the Caruthers family in Denton who hired her while she was still in college. They were involved in many different business ventures, and she learned a lot about running businesses. To this day Tommy Caruthers, Sr. is her business mentor. In 2004 her family bought a Dickey's Barbecue franchise and in 2005 built and opened a restaurant in Roanoke and invited her to be involved. She resisted for a time, but eventually joined them, lending her business, public relations and computer expertise. During this time, Rosina got involved in politics in Tarrant County. "The WHY behind legislation and regulations is intriguing, figuring out everyone's agenda."

In December 2012, she left the family business to devote more time to women's ministry. She completed Sexual Assault Advocate Training at Abigail's Arms in 2012-2013, and is on the task force for establishing a Child Advocacy Center at Abigail's Arms.

Business, accounting and people skills are all important in her work on the Board of the Indian Creek Volunteer Fire Department, which covers 73 square miles. A firefighter friend, who knew of her background, and of the VFD's need for leadership with financial management skills, encouraged her to run for the board. She submitted a letter of nomination, was interviewed, and accepted as a candidate. The Board has only five elected members, four from Lake Kiowa. One must live outside LK. Living in the rural area between LK and Burns City, Rosina fills that spot. The extent of political involvement surprised Rosina the most. "Volunteer Fire Departments are an extension of County Government," she explained. "We interact with the County Judge, our Commissioners, and our State Rep and Senator on a continual basis as we look out for the interest of the residents we serve and of the business administration of the fire department itself."

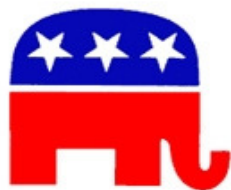
